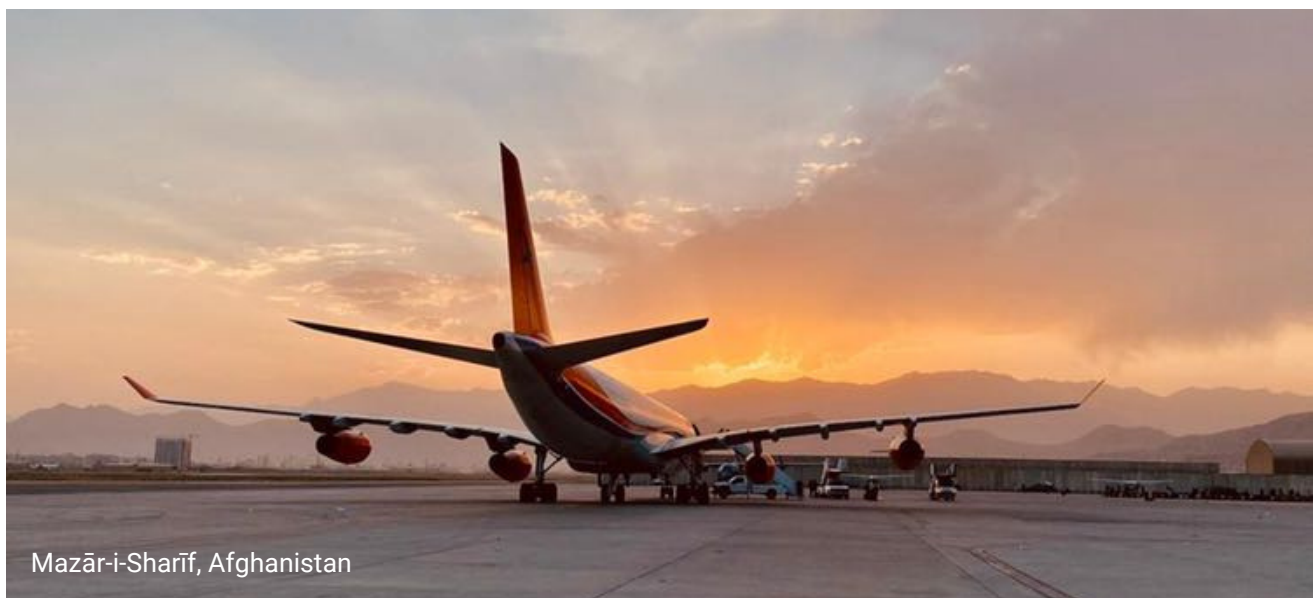

You provided education for hearing impaired children.

📍 South Africa



Children with deafness or a hearing loss have special educational needs and any degree of hearing loss is an impediment to a developing child. The Carel du Toit Centre in South Africa is an all-encompassing school that offers an early intervention program and Listening and Spoken Language environment for children with hearing impairment.

In 2021, Greater Change provided financial support for five hearing-impaired students so they could benefit from this specialized education. We helped cover the costs of tuition, transportation, school supplies, and meals for these young children so they can be equipped to enter the hearing world with an improved potential to integrate and thrive.

You supported displaced youth.

Iraq

In early 2021, Greater Change successfully transferred the operations of the community center to a capable organization that shared our same vision for reaching the residents of Kabarto Camp. We stayed engaged and continued to support a local teacher to teach children and youth at the community center. Her average class size was 15 students with each class lasting six to eight weeks.

In October 2021, two Greater Change Board Members visited Iraq to work with the youth at the community center and pray for a new vision for 2022. They spent several days with a group of 20, engaging them with stories of youth that changed the world. They also took the youth on a trip to the zoo, which was an exciting and unique experience for those who have lived in a camp for so long. Please continue to pray that God will touch these children's hearts with His love.



You evacuated vulnerable families from Afghanistan.

Afghanistan

As the Taliban swept through Afghanistan's provinces after U.S. forces withdrew, many families were desperate to leave before the Taliban took full power and hunted down those who opposed their rule. For months, Greater Change had a team of 12 people working around the clock to help high-risk families escape the country. Despite months of delays and paperwork issues, we were able to help dozens of families evacuate Afghanistan so they could move to another country to live in peace and without fear of being killed.

We also provided additional assistance as best we could. In one case, we helped an abused Afghan mother and her four children escape into a neighboring country, connected her to resources, and then covered their visa cost for the next three months to allow them to maintain legal status.

Thanks to the abundant generosity of our donors, we were able to facilitate the evacuation of more than 125 people from Afghanistan.

Afghanistan

Through local partners, Greater Change was able to get food and other supplies into the hands of families struggling to survive. We were even able to distribute food to people in war-torn provinces as the Taliban fought to take back control of the country. As a result of your generosity, 650 Afghan families received aid in their time of desperate need.

Meet Ghulam Sakhi (pictured bottom right). His story, like many others, is filled with hardship. As a young man, he lost his father in a rocket attack while his mother later died of illness. Two years after the death of his father, Sakhi's younger brother was killed by border security forces as he tried to flee to Iran. Unable to stay where he was, Sakhi moved to a different part of the country a year ago without a job, money, or food. Thankfully, he and his family were able to stay in a relative's house.

Due to lack of job opportunities, Sakhi works as a daily laborer just three days a week, earning about \$2.40 USD per work day. With little income to purchase food and medicine, Sakhi and his wife, Ashour, worry about the future of their children. Desperate, they sought help from humanitarian organizations. After being connected with our local partners, Greater Change was able to provide Sakhi, his wife, and their three daughters the food they needed to get through those winter months. Their family was one of many that found hope through Greater Change food distributions.
